2025 National Crime Victims' Rights Week

Award Categories

<u>Survivor / Activist:</u> For a victim of crime who has taken their own personal experience and transformed it into action or advocacy on behalf of other victims of crime.

<u>Outstanding Advocacy</u>: For an advocate who has shown excellence in skill and compassion within their role and has made a difference for a victim/survivor.

<u>Ally Award:</u> For a volunteer, professional or program who, outside of the course of performing their regular duties, has advocated for a victim-centered policies and/or implemented practices that have created significant changes for victims and crime/violence prevention. This can include activities that enhance offender accountability, community response to violence, and/or community outreach and education.

<u>Career Achievement</u>: This award is presented to individuals who have demonstrated exceptional dedication to victim services over their career or lifetime and have changed the culture and practice of Vermont to be safer and more responsive to victims of crime.

<u>Justice for All Award</u>: Given to recognize a professional whose work has demonstrated outstanding service to crime victims from diverse communities.
